History of KSA

In 1973, the students of the Alliance Bible Seminary held an evangelical meeting in a prison, and they started the New Life Fellowship for rehabilitated persons

In 1978, the Hong Kong Christian Kun Sun Association was established with an office and staff.

In 1980, the Hong Kong Christian Kun Sun Association Limited became fully registered, and received tax-exemption as a not for profit organisation.

Over the years KSA has worked with various government departments (the Correctional Services Department, the Social Welfare Department and the Immigration Department) to enter into correctional institutions and juvenile homes in order to provide diversified services to inmates. Aftercare ministry were also provided to follow up those who had left the prisons. In addition, KSA showed concern for the families of inmates and rehabilitated persons through providing various support programs and help to them.

Religious Classes

The Association holds regular monthly meetings in many Correctional Institutions, Detention Centres and Children and Juvenile Homes to preach the gospel and provide pastoral care to interested inmates. Christian faith helps inmates to cleanse their hearts and minds, to experience peace and calm, encounter Christ, and reflect on the value of life. Religious classes are prepared and led by our staff and volunteers, and we use various teaching materials for new and mature believers in different institutions to let the inmates hear the gospel of Jesus Christ and be discipled so that they can experience ongoing transformation in their lives. Chinese and English language religious classes are held in various institutions in order to cater for the diverse population of inmates. Volunteers who speak languages other than Chinese and English are also welcome as there are inmates of countries who don't speak either of these languages who are so blessed to hear the gospel in their own language.

Letter Writing Ministry

Volunteers correspond with inmates through the Association and become pen pals with them providing an avenue for inmates to express their feelings through their letters. Volunteers can also show care for the inmates through letter writing and build relationships with them, hopping that the inmates can be encouraged, nurtured and blessed through the biblical words quoted in the letters.

Bible Correspondence Courses

To help Christian inmates grow in their spiritual lives, we provide them distance-learning course in Christian Studies. Apart from the New Life of True Light Biblical Course and the Emmaus Bible Course, in 1999, we also began enrolling inmates in Distance Education courses of the Hong Kong Baptist Theological Seminary for systematic studies of the Christian faith, helping them to have a strong foundation in the truth and to share their testimonies in prison. We hope that these distance-learning courses can guide the inmates to think about life and the enlightenment of faith so that they can have a solid foundation in their faith and spread the Good News even when in prison just like the apostles of Jesus Christ. In between religious classes, correspondence courses allow faith seekers to continue studying biblical truths.

Aftercare Ministry

Full Grace Fellowship and Seeds Fellowship

KSA has set up different forms of pastoral groups for local and foreign rehabilitated persons to deepen their religious experience, support each other, and help them to transition into the church.

Youth Onesimus Fellowship

Utilising different activities to gather rehabilitated young people and help them grow in love and truth.

Onesimus Training Scheme

Providing training in life skills and ministry for rehabilitated persons in order to build a strong foundation in faith and doctrine then building them up to become suitable to serve and minister in different positions. The training also prepares the students to return to the prison to testify.

Male Hostels and Female Hostels

Provide residential training for rehabilitated persons, not only to help them stabilize their lives, but also to help them develop a consistent Spiritual life. In the hostels they learn discipline, personal growth and how to manage interpersonal relationships.

She had taken drugs for more than 20 years, been in and out of prison many times, and her family had kept a distance from her. Being unable to extricate herself from drugs not only made her spend her money but also led to a decline in her health. One time after taking drugs, she fainted and was sent to the hospital. When she woke up, she asked herself: "Do you want to take drugs until the moment you die?"

After she was discharged from the hospital, she was determined to get rid of the shackles and moved into the female dormitory of the Kun Sun Association recommended by a friend. "Physical addiction is easy to quit, but addiction in the mind is hard to get rid of." She is grateful that the dormitories in the female dormitory are all "rehabilitated persons" who can empathise with her struggles, this along with the support of other sisters, she finally succeeded to overcome her former way of life.

Later, she participated in the Onesimus training program, received spiritual empowerment, successfully graduated from the program and returned to the prison and also to serve in the Full Grace Fellowship. So she used her experience to encourage prisoners and rehabilitated persons to spur each other on towards love and good deeds.

Family Support Services

Angel Tree Christmas Programme

Every Christmas, KSA staff and volunteers will provide Christmas gifts to the children of prisoners under the age of 12 on behalf of their parents in the adult prisons; at the same time they will also give gifts to parents of prisoners on behalf of the young offenders in the youth homes. We encourage churches to visit the family members of churches and to follow up with them and provide continuous care.

"Mentorship Programme" for the children of Inmates and rehabilitated persons

This program matches a suitable and trained volunteer (Mentor) to a child (Mentee) of a prisoner or rehabilitated person. In the plan, the mentors will commit themselves to meet regularly with their mentees and take them out for activities. Using their own experience and the training they were given, the mentors will help the mentees face any difficulties and trials that they encounter, so that they can have a person to walk with them providing constant care and love. This has had a positive impact on the growth of the mentees.

"Back to School" Programme

Understanding that many families of local inmates and rehabilitated persons are facing financial difficulties, expenditure for the commencement of the school year is another financial burden for them. The 'Back to School' programme is promoted to the inmates through the Correctional

Services Department and to the families of rehabilitated persons. The programme provides the children of inmates and rehabilitated persons various support for school supplies.
